

David Colodny is a supervising attorney in the Community Development Project of the Urban Justice Center. Since joining the Community Development Project (CDP) in 2005, David has represented low-wage immigrant workers who are participating in organizing campaigns led by community based worker centers to improve working conditions in restaurant, construction, domestic, nail salon and other industries. The majority of David's work is representing groups of workers bringing suit under the Fair Labor Standards Act and New York Labor Law for wage theft violations such as minimum wage, overtime, unpaid wages and tip misappropriation violations. Prior to joining CDP, David worked for the D.C. Employment Justice Center (2001-2005) and the law firm of Patton Boggs LLP (1995-2000).

Elizabeth Joynes is the Supervising Attorney of the Workplace Justice Legal Team at Make the Road New York. Elizabeth coordinates employment legal services and legal support of worker justice organizing campaigns, and maintains an active caseload of workers' rights cases. Prior to Make the Road, as a Skadden Fellow and then Associate Counsel at LatinoJustice PRLDEF, Elizabeth coordinated the Latinas At Work (LAW) Project to advocate on behalf of low-wage and immigrant workers. Elizabeth co-taught a seminar on Labor Law: Wage and Hour Laws as an Adjunct Professor at Fordham Law School in the Spring 2013 and Spring 2014 semesters.
